aper Image of Holt is a household and business name, whether residents in Delhi Township have heard of them or not. It's likely that the school magnet on the fridge, the menus at the local restaurant, or the yard signs in the neighbor's front yard were all made by Paper Image.

The business has been a fixture in the community officially for over three decades, starting out as a coop run by MSU students. From those humble beginnings, the print center has grown to be a major commercial printer in the Greater Lansing area. Clothing finds second chance at Deep Closets Clothing Alterations and Consignments

ntrepreneurship is something that runs in the family for Deep Closets co-owner, Sandy McDonell. The clothing alterations and consignments store owner grew up in her mother's small alterations business in Okemos when she was a young girl, and being a small business owner was something she knew she wanted to get back to some day.



Fast-forward to 2022 when McDonell opened Deep Closets in Holt with her mother, Mui Luc. After several life changes in both their lives, the time seemed right for the mother-daughter duo to open the business together. As a close team in their personal lives, it seemed only natural to go into business together. They also decided another good pairing would be alterations as part of their consignment business.

The pair love shopping and knew that many times when finding something second-hand, a piece might be the perfect fit if not for one alteration - whether an extra strap here or a shorter hem there. They opened

Deep Closets in July of last year and began accepting consignments later in the year.

One thing McDonell particularly prides the shop on is its variety. While many other consignment shops offer only womens' clothing, Deep Closets carries shoes, accessories, as well as mens' and children's clothing. They offer alterations on everything from jackets to

> jeans to formal wear; any alteration that was purchased in-store will also receive half-off the alteration price. Alterations usually have a turnaround time of one week. Deep Closets tries to keep upto-date with events happening in the community, especially school dances, and keeps a great supply of trendy and affordable formal wear.

"I know that times are getting tough and maybe if it helps, we have excellent gently used clothing," says McDonell. "I try to keep really nice things in here for everyone. If it helps you clean out your closet and make a couple dollars. And it

helps keep the sustainability for second-hand clothing."

Those looking to consign items through the shop should contact the shop to schedule an appointment. McDonell is always looking for in-season items. Items are consigned for 60 days. If the item sells, the consignee gets 40% of the sale and the store gets 60%. If items do not sell within 60 days, consignees are contacted to pick-up their items, otherwise items are donated to local domestic violence survivor organizations.

Second Esker Square apartment building underway

esidents driving by the Esker Square apartment community on Cedar Street may start to see the structure of a new building going up this spring. The first apartment building officially began taking tenants earlier this year, and this new development is the second part of the Esker Square project.

"One of the things we're most proud of at Esker Square is the fact that the building, and soon to be buildings, are creating an urban core for Delhi Township," says Scott Gillespie, Founder and Chief Executive Officer of The Gillespie Company, the developer for the Esker Square project. "They're creating some height, some density...and hopefully more residents for current businesses and future businesses."

The Esker Square project is meant to help bring more of an urban feeling to Delhi Township, offering some of the first live/work apartments in the area. Live/work apartments offer tenants a unique experience to have their living space and work in the same location, while allowing them to be separate.

These spaces are perfect for those who work from home, own a side business,

or run their own business and still want to have a storefront. The building's first floor is entirely made up of these live/ work spaces. This set-up harkens back to old town America when small business owners operated their business out of their homes.

While these styles of apartments provide a commercial vibe to the buildings, the apartments are also comfortable and welcoming, making tenants feel at home. This is an important shift The Gillespie Company has seen in recent years surrounding changes in the housing market. More individuals are looking to rent but still want a space with the feeling and amenities of home. The Esker Square apartments are looking to fill that gap.

In addition to the live/work spaces, there are also traditional apartments on the second and third floors of the buildings. These one and two-bedroom apartments offer everything from stainless steel appliances, to individual washer and dryers in each apartment, to a patio and full kitchen.

The Gillespie Company has also designed the interiors of the apartments to fit any style, choosing neutral color palettes



and designs to give tenants more of an opportunity to make the space their own.

This also takes into account the wide range of tenants Delhi Township sees. "What we're looking for here is to service a very broad market, and we feel that the market is quite broad here in Delhi, from recently graduated students, young professionals to young families, all the way through seniors to empty nesters," Gillespie says. "We're excited to provide a product and provide living space where people can live their lives and go through their life moments."

Proactively policing through relationship building

elationships are a vital part of any community it's in the connections between neighbors, residents with local businesses, and businesses with each other. The Delhi Township Division of the Ingham County Sheriff's Office understands how important a part relationships play in communities.



"People that live in these communities know when something is out of place and when something is out of character," says Lieutenant Chauncey Shattuck. He attributes this to not only neighbors knowing neighbors, but also the role

technology and his department play.

Communication tools like social media and applications have made it easier to prevent and investigate crimes. While criminals are also using social media to spread information, every day citizens are using social media to help prevent crime. Along with neighborhood social media pages that can help as part of Neighborhood Watch programs, there are also applications like Nextdoor, where neighborhoods can get local tips and buy and sell items.

The sheriff's office also has a Facebook page where they provide up-to-date information and press releases. The page is monitored daily so residents can provide tips directly to the page in addition to calling the department.

"Anytime you can use some type of medium to increase communication throughout communities, you're going to become stronger," Shattuck says. "And the more you know your neighbors, the more you know when something doesn't fit or something looks out of place."

Shattuck also believes it's important for him and his officers to be a visible part of the community. He wants residents and business owners to be used to seeing officers out and about, stopping in to businesses to say hello and check in on what's happening. Shattuck feels this visibility is important for those considering potential crimes as well.

"The only way I've seen to help prevent violent crime or robbery is proactive policing, because when you're out in the community, making contacts or stopping cars, everyone sees that. Good and bad. And they know that if they cross the road and come down into Holt, there's a good chance they might have contact with the police department and if they're up to no good, they might think twice," Shattuck says.

This is the type of policing the Delhi Division is constantly striving for, and Lt. Shattuck believes they're seeing the positive results of this. His hope is the community feels the support and comfort of knowing and seeing him and his team out and about.

A.J. Black built this building in the 1890s as a general store. The building was home to Bliss Hardware from 1917 to 1959. It has since been home to several businesses, including McDowell's Studio of Tae Kwon Do, and, since 2003, Original Okinawan Karate of Holt. The Black Building remains the oldest commercial building in Downtown Holt.
